




For our latest project, *Textiles We Treasure*, we took the ballet of *The Firebird* as inspiration and made headdresses modelled on traditional Russian kokoshniks, decorating them with things we liked. The decorative panels above and on other pages are kokoshniks made by Little Ilford Embroidery Group.









Opposite is a painting by Tahir inspired by the backdrop of the *The Firebird* ballet first performed in Paris in 1910. The ballet was based on an old Russian folk tale with music by Stravinsky. It was created in our outreach class, which partnered with *Hopeful Futures* (an organisation for people with learning disabilities and autism). It depicts the onion domes of Russian churches, while the bright colours are like the Russian folk art that was the inspiration for the costumes and set of the original ballet. The puppets are characters from the folk tale.

# Kokoshniks by The McGrath Makers.

Kokoshniks were traditional headware in the northern parts of Russia for women of all classes. They first appeared in the 10th century and are still worn today.

In the 19th century. they became part of Russian court dress.

When Russians fled to Paris after the Russian Revolution in 1918 they took this tradition with them, where it was copied by French fashion designers, becoming the inspiration for headdresses throughout Europe.

Making together is at the heart of all our projects. The McGrath Makers have been involved with nearly all projects run by East London Textile Arts and now have their own organisation. The McGrath Makers regularly model clothes made by Little Ilford Embroidery Group as well as modelling costumes created from their own textile designs.

Skilled women love to volunteer with *The McGrath Makers*, working behind the scenes to design their embroideries into printed textiles from which others make clothes, while volunteers make quilts from the original embroideries.

For many years *The McGrath Makers* have contributed to exhibitions held by *East London Textile Arts*, in Newham Libraries and further afield — often at the *Art Workers' Guild*. They held their own exhibition at the little gallery-cum-haberdashery in Bethnal Green, *Prick Your Finger*, run by Rachael Matthews. This autumn they are holding their first exhibition in the *Hopkins Room* at Stratford Library, where it will remain for three months.

The McGrath Makers will be creating craftwork based on the diverse textile heritages of Newham. They have started to make bunting using designs from flags from countries their families came from. Next there are plans to decorate Indian animals, and we will see what can be made from these. Maybe cards, textile designs, clothes, bags. Maybe members of the *Little Ilford Embroidery Group* will be inspired to use the embroideries in their designs!



In the coming year *The McGrath Makers* will exhibit their new work with *East London Textile Arts* at the *Art Workers' Guild*. It will also be exhibited in an online gallery on their website. The outreach project will continue to work with a group of people with early stage dementia, as well as with those with learning disabilities and autism through its ongoing partnership with *Hopeful Futures*.
